Year of the Celosia

Overview and History

Celosia has been growing in North America since the 1700s and is native to tropical America and Africa. Here in the U.S., we know it as an annual, however, it is a tender perennial in zones 10 to 12. Not only have these plants been grown for their beauty in the garden, but they are also used for food in many places around the world. Celosia argentea, also known as Lagos Spinach, is used for its highly nutritious green foliage and young shoots. It is often steamed or used in soups or stews in Indonesian, Indian and African dishes.

Celosia is comprised of 45 different species in the Amaranth family (Amaranthaceae). Mainly produced by seed, but also produced vegetatively, Celosia argentea cultivars can be grouped into 3 different categories: Plumosa types, Cristata types, and Spicata types.

How to Grow Celosia in Your Garden

Celosia likes a warm sunny spot in the garden. Be sure to give these plants at least 6-8 hours of full sun and if you live in cooler northern climates you should wait until May or June to plant them, or at least until temperatures are above 55 degrees F.

The soil must be well drained. If you have heavy clay soils that need to be improved, you can use compost or sand to improve the drainage. They prefer soils to have a pH of 6-6.5 with high organic matter content.

After planting you will need to fertilize your plants monthly with a general-purpose fertilizer with equal amounts of Nitrogen, Phosphorus, and Potassium (N-P-K).

Stake taller varieties to prevent them from falling over.

Removing the old blooms will help to promote the production of new flowers.


If your plant develops brown or tan holes in its leaves, it may be suffering from the fungal disease leaf spot. You can use a ready-to-use copper fungicide on the infected areas.


Spider mites can be a common cause of death for Celosia. These spiders are very tiny and hard to catch before they do a lot of damage. Brown-bronze foliage that is becoming dry and brittle is a sign of spider mites.

Celosia flowers can be used as dried flowers for displays. Hang them upside down for 2 weeks to dry.



It is often used as a 'filler' in the 'spiller-thriller-filler' container combination, providing a mass of flowers and foliage against which the thriller plants stand out.







Impatiens 'Sanibel & Rosy Mix'

- ▶Impatiens used to be America's No. 1-selling summer annual flower until a deadly powdery mildew disease hit in 2012. Breeders have now developed two lines of traditional impatiens that naturally fight off the disease. Imara XDR debuted in 2019 in seven colors. Beacons are debuting in 2020 in seven colors.

- ▶Where to use: Shady to partly shaded beds are best, such as along northern and eastern foundations or in wooded gardens. They'll grow in sunnier spots, too, if the soil is kept damp. All are excellent choices for pots and hanging baskets in shady spots.
- ▶ Care: Plant out after danger of frost passes in spring (mid-May or after). In pots and baskets, water daily when it doesn't rain, and fertilize with a half-strength flower fertilizer every week or two. In the ground, fertilize monthly with a balanced, organic, or long-acting granular fertilizer formulate for flowers.

Justicia 'Fruit Cocktail' Shrimp Plant

A charming addition for any sunny to partly sunny exposure, its golden lime-colored bracts, accented by bright red flowers, crown this upright grower in a never-ending display. As easy to grow as any in this genus, it tops the list as a free bloomer. Use it to brighten south, east or west exposures. Makes a nice potted container for the summer garden.

2023 Edible of the Year: Broccoli

Broccoli hails from the Mediterranean region and has been enjoyed there since Roman times. Other European regions eventually caught on and broccoli was popularized in France as "Italian Asparagus" in about 1650. The English adopted it about 70 years later.

We have been broccoli fans across the US since the 1920s when ice-packed broccoli heads rode the rails from California to the eastern US. In 2011, the United States produced more than 2 billion pounds with a value of over \$750 million on more than 130,000 acres.

Broccoli is good for you! It is high in antioxidants, amino acids, folate, and vitamin C. This edible is also an immunity booster thanks to its zinc and vitamin content.

How To Grow

- Broccoli prefers cooler seasons like early spring and fall in most regions.
- Choose a growing area that has not held broccoli or cabbage (or other close relatives) in the past year or two if possible. This will decrease the buildup of insect and disease pests in that area.
- · Broccoli likes good drainage and air circulation.
- Full sun is nice but partial shade will work.
- Six plants in a 4 x 6-foot area will be very happy.
- Broccoli prefers soil high in nitrogen so work in a balanced fertilizer or some compost while planting.
- Many gardeners plant transplants they purchased. When shopping for transplants, look for healthy but small plants that have not outgrown their pots; they will transplant better and grow more quickly than their root-bound neighbors.
- If starting from seed, start seeds about 4-6 weeks before planting. Seed should be started indoors about 6 weeks before the last frost date in the spring. Check your seed catalog or seed packet, or with a local extension office, for more information on the best time to plant. For a fall crop, start seeds indoors in August or September.
- Spread mulch around the plants to hold soil moisture in and prevent weeds.
- Container-grown plants should be planted in a large container-at least 2 gallons with one plant per pot. Water well and regularly.
- Remove any worms or aphids you find on the plant with a strong stream of water or pick them off.

Pepper 'Armageddon'

Armageddon is the world's first F1 super-hot chili.

Pepper 'Dragonfly'

▶2022 AAS Edible-Vegetable Winner

Dragonfly pepper plants produce beautiful purple peppers that have thick, sweet walls, unlike the thin papery walls of other purples on the market. Similar to the beloved dragonfly that flits around your garden, this pepper transforms itself from a green pepper into a purple fruit that is as delicious at the green stage of maturity as it is when fully purple and mature. Overall, it's a much better purple color than comparisons with above average, robust pepper flavor. Fruits are held high on the plant, keeping them from the soil. The 4-lobed fruits do not fade and if left on the vine, turn a beautiful, bright red turn a beautiful, bright red color.





Tomato 'Carolina Gold'

▶The Carolina Gold tomato features a unique golden-yellow colored fruit that is low in acid and uniform ripening. This variety is adaptable, and its strong, determinate plant produces mostly extra-large and large fruit throughout the season. To maximize yield potential, stake culture is recommended. Resistant to Verticillium wilt and Fusarium wilt (1,2).

Tomato 'Sun Dipper'

- ▶60 to 65 Days
- ►Unique, eye-catching, elongated fruits are an attractive orange.

2023 Herb of the Year: Ginger

Herb of the Year 2023 - Ginger Zingiber Officinale

Ginger Zingiber Officinale is a flowering plant whose rhizome (Ginger Root) is used for culinary and medicinal purposes. The root is gnarled and has a pungent spicy-sweet flavor. It is an herb native to humid, tropical forest in Southeast Asia. It is one of the oldest known spices.

Ginger is grown by planting root stalk cuttings in fertile soil. The plant will grow 2 to 4 feet tall with grass like leaves and yellow flowers it takes approximately 10 months to grow to full maturity. Once the leaves die the rhizomes are dug up from underground. Fresh ginger root is light brown on the outside and pale yellow inside.

Ginger is considered a spice when used ground or powdered. It is an herb when used fresh and considered a vegetable when used culinary. It can be used in baking, teas, sauces, soups, and added to tofu, rice, veggies and meats. Ginger Ale is made with ginger root.

Ginger aids digestion, helps reduce nausea and headaches. It is also be used to help with colds and flu and has anti-inflammatory and antioxidant effects.

2023 Year of the Rudbeckia

It's no wonder that the ever-popular Rudbeckia was chosen for this year's perennial of the year because of its bright colors, ease of growing, and the vast range of both new and old varieties to choose from.

Try growing it once and you'll be hooked forever on this North American native.

Rugged durability, extreme heat tolerance, and summer-long flower power make Rudbeckia one of the most popular perennials sold today in many parts of North America. It's no wonder as it can be found naturally and thrives in all 48 contiguous states and in all 10 provinces of Canada.

Thanks to North American botanist John Bartram, seeds of our native Rudbeckia were sent to Europe via Englishman Peter Collins. This is how Carl Linnaeus (1707-1778) came across them and named them after Olof Rudbeck (1660-1740), a teacher at Uppsala University in Sweden with whom he worked for. (Linnaeus is now known as the "father of taxonomy's" system of binomial nomenclature.)

It is said that as Linnaeus was putting together his nomenclature, he chose the name Rudbeckia because the tall flower reflected Rudbeck's tall stature, and the ray-like petals bore "witness that you shone among savants like the sun among stars." What a wonderful tribute!

Finally, a Black Eyed Susan that's resistant to the Septoria leaf spot! Thanks to the thinner and hairier leaves, this hybrid Rudbeckia shows no signs of the fungus even in wet, humid conditions. A dome-like habit of golden yellow flowers with black centers are produced heavily from July to September here in Michigan, with some color until frost. Destined to be the new staple for landscapes! 2023 Proven Winners Perennial of the Year: Heuchera 'Dolce Wildberry'



The intense purple color of these leaves are second to none! Compared to 'Blackberry Ice', the foliage is larger, a richer hue, and holds onto its purple color for much of the season. Large, scalloped, incredibly glossy leaves are a bold shade of purple. Charcoal veins accent the leaf color that make the leaves really pop. Dark stems hold rosy pink calyxes and white flowers. A must have!


Coral bells are easy to grow and blend easily with most other perennials in the landscape. Because of their low, mounding habit, they are often used as edging along paths or in containers. Try cutting a few of the tall flower scapes for fresh bouquets.

Alcea 'Spotlight Purple Rain' & 'Blackberry Ripple' Hollyhocks

- ▶ Blackberry Ripple has double purple-black and white blossoms with dark green foliage. It will bloom in summer. Plant in full sun.
- Spotlight Purple Rain is a true perennial hollyhock which flowers the first year from seed, brilliant blue-purple single flowers bloom on tall stately stalks all summer.
- ► Use hollyhocks in a cottage garden or as a back border in a perennial garden. It has an impressive effect when planted in a mass planting.
- Hummingbirds, butterflies and bees are attracted to the flowers and deer tend to stay away.

Allium 'Bubble Bath' Ornamental Onion

Soft lavender flower clusters are held on strong stems above a mound of glaucous blue green foliage. The wide, linear leaves have a slight twist. Compared to 'Millenium', 'Bubble Bath' has lighter purple flowers on larger 3" flower clusters. Compared with the bulb-type varieties like 'Globemaster', this type of Allium will have smaller, more numerous flower clusters, bloom in summer instead of spring, and have foliage that stays attractive through fall.

▶ Alliums are charming plants for the rock or herb garden. When the foliage is bruised, it smells like onions since they are in the onion family. Butterflies and honeybees adore the flowers' sweet nectar but deer and rabbits steer clear of this perennial beauty.

Aster 'Pink Crush'

▶Bringing refinement to fall blooming Asters, 'Pink Crush' produces a large, very round mound with densely packed flowers. We have observed no lodging in our trials, a phenomenal achievement for fall blooming Asters. Rose pink flowers are produced above dark green foliage in early fall to midfall. This variety is shorter than 'Grape Crush'. A perfect finale to the growing season!

Asters are native to North America and are generally very easy to grow.

Astilbe 'Dark Side of the Moon'

An instant classic for the landscape! 'Dark Side of the Moon' is the only dark leafed Astilbe with purple flowers that's on the market. Rich deep chocolate burgundy leaves form an incredibly attractive mound of foliage. Emerging leaves are yellow with a dark margin with a glossy sheen that become completely dark as they age. 

The foliage of 'Blackhawks' emerges deep green to dark purple in spring and deepens to near black by fall here in Michigan. This grass matures a little more than a foot shorter than 'Indian Warrior'. One of the very best Big Bluestem from hybridizer Brent Horvath.

Dubbed the "monarch of the prairie", this native grass was once the dominant component of the American tallgrass prairie. It adapts easily to a wide range of soil and moisture conditions as long as full sun is provided. This grass is very versitile from a design standpoint; it is effective as a specimen, in masses, for screening, alongside ponds or streams, or even in large containers.



2023 Year of the Spirea

- ▶These durable, easy-to-grow shrubs have dominated many regions of the United States for decades thanks to their tolerance for a wide variety of conditions.
- ▶ The genus name, Spirea, originates from the Greek word, speira, or "wreath" in reference to the orientation of the shrub's delicate flowers. With nearly 100 unique species, this hardy group of plants boasts a wide range of colorful foliage ranging from blue to yellow, red, to orange, and everything in between. They truly are America's heartland landscape plant.
- ▶ Spirea How-To's for Your Landscape
 - ▶These plants are fast-growing, even the most compact varieties, making them highly desirable for quick fill-in plantings, massing, hedges, and foundations.
 - Spirea are deciduous, meaning they drop their leaves each fall and can usually handle winter just fine. They are hardy to USDA Hardiness Zones 4 8 and can tolerate winter temperatures of 15-30 degrees Fahrenheit.
 - ▶Best grown in full sun. Generally, those planted in shadier spots tend to become lanky and do not bloom as well. Once established, they are one of the lowest maintenance, easy-to-grow shrubs.
 - ▶Routine pruning of old wood can be done if the plants are getting larger than desired. It is best to prune after flowering. Thin out branches from the center to improve air circulation. Unlike some landscape plants, every few years you can prune spirea hard, by as much as two-thirds if you want to clean up overgrown plants.
 - Deadheading, or removal of spent flowers, is not necessary. Flowering will be more prolific when the plants have adequate moisture in spring and summer. Mulching with wood chips or shredded bark will help retain moisture.
 - If you live in urban areas, have no fear, spirea are well suited to tolerate poor soil, pollution, drought, heat, and extreme cold temperatures. They prefer well-drained soil that should be kept moist their first year, watering deeply, especially during the hot summer months. Once established, minimal supplemental watering should be needed. While fall is the best time to plant, they can be planted anytime during the growing season.
 - Spirea are generally not preferred to be grazed on by wildlife such as deer and rabbits. However, their beautiful blooms attract the happiest show of butterflies, bees, and other pollinators.

'Triumph' Apple Tree

- Triumph® produces attractive fruit with occasional stem bowl russeting. It has demonstrated excellent scab tolerance, good fresh eating qualities and long storage life. This variety may be well suited to direct market and organic producers.
- Taste-wise, Triumph® is a pleasantly tart and well-balanced red apple with good storage life. It will be ready to harvest in late September, similar to or slightly later than its parent 'Honeycrisp' and is hardy to USDA Zone 4.





'Trader' White Mulberry Tree

- ▶This mulberry is a cross between white and red mulberry trees. This vigorous tree will produce large, sweet-tasting, virtually-seedless, black fruit throughout the entire summer.
- Mulberry tree brought from Germany by Bill Trader Mulberry tree brought from Germany by Bill Trader is still alive and well on the family farm in Oriska, North Dakota after more than a century. That is testimony to its tolerance to extremes of cold. The great grandaddy tree is now over 125 years old and reaches a height of 35 feet and is almost the same in width. Its longevity is attributable to its resistance to disease and insects. In brief, it is a fairly care-free, no-worry tree. In North Dakota, the fruits ripen over the months of July to early September in true everbearing fashion. By that time, the shiny, deep green, heart shaped leaves of summer turn to the bright yellow leaves of autumn. It is a fast-growing tree. A 2-year-old specimen will bear fruit in just 3 years.
- ▶This variety will grow in USDA zones 3 to 7.
- The mulberries are 1-1.5" long, juicy with a sweet mulberry flavor, that's tart when first ripe and sweet a few days later. Mulberries can be eaten fresh or dried, or made into pies, jellies, juice or wine. Use them in imaginative desserts, drinks, or for easy freezing for whenever. Or you can just let the birds enjoy them and add to your bird-watching pleasure. The black berries are 1 ½ "long, juicy, and tart like a wild blackberry. They have a distinctive aroma. The fruit has excellent nutritional value and multiple health benefits.

Northern Catalpa Tree

The northern catalpa is a large, upright tree. Its bark is a gray-brown that becomes scaly with age. Leaves are simple and large, 6" to 10" long, and heart-shaped. They grow in a whorled or opposite arrangement along branches. In fall the leaves will become yellow-green to brown. Northern catalpa has large showy flowers that are upright in 4" to 8" clusters. The flowers are white, bell-shaped flowers with orange stripes and purple spots and stripes. The fruit of the catalpa is a pod-like capsule, 8" to 20" inches long which is filled with winged seeds.

▶ Prefers alkaline soil and moist, well-drained soil. The catalpa will tolerate wet sites that experience occasional flooding as well as dry sites. It is also moderately tolerant of road salts.

▶Often used in the landscape as a shade tree or ornamental due to its flowers. A good choice for harsh urban conditions. It tolerates drought, poor drainage, and road salt fairly well. It is somewhat of a weak wooded tree and should be planted with caution; the branches can break off during storms. These trees make great landscape additions if pruned and cared for properly.

The catalpa's large showy flowers are utilized by insect pollinators.

Native from the lower Midwest into the southern states. Well suited for the urban landscape in Minnesota.

Susceptible to verticillium wilt, leaf spots, mildew, and twig blight. No serious insect or disease problems.
